ROAD TRIP TO HISTORY'S WAYNE BRONSON TO BE GUEST SPEAKER AT 142ND ANNIVERSARY OF WOMEN'S MEMORIAL SOCIETY TO HONOR CIVIL WAR SOLDIERS

On Friday, May 15, 2009 at 10:30 am The Women's Memorial Society will hold its annual commemorative ceremony at St. Matthew's Cemetery honoring the anniversary of the 1864 Civil War Battle of New Market. Beginning in 1867, the tribute is held each year at the Confederate monument in St. Matthew's Cemetery located behind Reformation Lutheran Church on Congress Street in New Market, Virginia. A memorial wreath will be placed in remembrance of the Southern soldiers who participated in the May 15, 1864 Battle of New Market. The casualties included ten young soldiers from the Virginia Military Institute.

This year's guest speaker is the creator of the PBS series Road Trip to History, Wayne Bronson. Mr. Bronson is the Executive Producer of the series featuring "The Great Valley Road", now US Route 11, and has written "If there is one thing that you will rediscover on Road Trip to History it most definitely will be that these small towns are truly the backbone of America."

VMI cadets will participate in the ceremony and Jeff Sonafelt, pastor of Reformation Lutheran Church, will provide the invocation and benediction. GATE students from Ashby Lee Elementary will be placing memorial flowers at the monument.

The public is cordially invited to attend this historic ceremony which was organized in 1867 by a group of ladies from New Market whose purpose was to honor their fathers, husbands, sons and betrothed who gave their lives during the War Between the States, 1861-1865. Originally named the Women's Memorial Society of the Lost Cause, the society was initially organized for the purpose of raising a fund to erect markers for Confederate soldiers and to care for their graves. On May 12, 1898, a monument at St. Matthew's Cemetery dedicated to the memory of the Southern soldiers and the VMI cadets was unveiled.

In the event of inclement weather, the ceremony will be held in the social hall of Reformation Lutheran Church.

NEW MARKET POLICE BLOTTER MARCH 2009

During the month the Police Department responded to 452 calls for service. There were 7 physical arrests, 4 DUI's, 1 Intoxicated in Public and 3 Under Age Possession of Alcohol. Officers worked 2 motor vehicle crashes and responded to 30 Mutual Aid calls to other agencies. The Police Department made 155 Traffic Stops, and issued 42 summonses for traffic violations.

The May, New Market Area Neighborhood Watch meeting is set for May 7, 2009 at 7:00 pm at the Town Hall.

Just a reminder that May is "Click It or Ticket" month and the Police Department will be conducting extra check points and roving patrols during this event, so please remember to **Buckle Up**.

TOUGH BUDGET YEAR

It's been hard to open the local newspaper this Spring and not find an article detailing how a local government is struggling to balance their budget. The national recession and declining funds from the state are making this one of the toughest budget years in recent memory. While the Town of New Market was not immune to these factors, we were somewhat insulated when compared to the counties and cities in the region. One of the primary reasons for this is because we do not rely as heavily on state funding as do the counties and cities.

The national recession is expected to impact General Fund revenues, which are predicted to decrease almost 15% from the 08-09 revenue predictions. People are eating out less, not taking vacations, not buying new cars, and overall reducing their spending. For this reason we are predicting losses in personal property tax, meals tax, lodging tax, and business/professional license tax revenues. To accommodate these losses we have proposed various cuts in the General Fund including most of the requested capital projects. Employee raises have been limited to a very modest 1.5% for July 1st with the option for Council to add another 1.5% halfway through the fiscal year if revenues rebound.

The Water and Sewer Account looks very different. We are showing an increase in revenues of over 100% from last year. This fund is inflated because of a \$9.1 million loan we expect to receive during the year to help pay for the Force Main and Pump Station project and the payoff of a \$4 million loan with Sun Trust. The Force Main and Pump Station project will transfer our wastewater to the Broadway Regional Plant as part of the regional sewer agreement. While this project is expensive, it has been estimated to be at least \$10 million cheaper than renovating our own wastewater plant. We have applied for Stimulus Funds for this project and by the time this article is published we will know if we will receive any of those funds. The \$4 million Sun Trust loan must be paid off in January of 2010. Those proceeds have been used to pay for the I&I project and for the engineering of the Force Main project.

The Town Council made it very clear from the beginning of the budget cycle that tax increases should be avoided this year. The proposed budget does not include any tax increases but does propose to increase some of the user fees in areas where the Town is not recouping its costs to provide these very specific services. These increases are in areas like private pool party fees, planning and zoning fees, and water reconnection fees. The idea of these increases was not to greatly increase revenues but to ensure that the users of these services were paying the full costs to provide these services, and thus taking more of the burden off of the general taxpayer. The Town Council and Town staff worked very hard this year to reduce expenditures without reducing the level of services provided to the citizens. A public hearing on the budget will be held in the Council Chambers on May 11th at 7:00 p.m. The public is encouraged to attend. The full budget is available at the Town Hall during normal business hours and on the Town website www.newmarketvirginia.com
