PUBLIC NOTICE

FIRE HYDRANT FLUSHING

Weather permitting, the Town of New Market will be flushing fire hydrants throughout the community June 13 - June 17, 2016. Some of this activity may occur at night. The hydrant flushing could cause some temporary discoloration of the water; however, the water is safe for consumption. To clear the water, a cold tap should be turned on and allowed to run until it clears. The water should also be checked for discoloration before running it into the washing machine. Periods of low pressure may be experienced during the hydrant flushing. The Water Department has asked that residents, especially drivers, take extra care during this time and take into account the possibility of water on the roadways.

The purpose of hydrant flushing is to clean the water mains and to check the mechanical condition and reliability of the fire hydrants and available water pressures for fire fighting purposes. “UP THE CREEK” 5K RACE - A SUCCESS !

The first annual Up the Creek 5K was held on Saturday, May 14, 2016 in New Market at the Shenvalee Creek course. This new race had 19 runners who completed the course in the one hour time limit. Runners were challenged with a course that included a wet grassy start, followed by a golf cart path that included some challenging up and down hills. The race coincides with the anniversary of the Battle of New Market in 1862.

With the limited number of runners, several walkers were included as winners. First place medals were given to top male and female runners in three age groups. Male winner in the 0-19 year age group and over-all winner was Ben Hutchinson with a course record of 23:03, female winner in that age group was Catherine Bulako 54:14. Male winner in the 20-39 age group was Brian Moats 54:11, and female winner was Amanda Polk with a women's course record of 27:43. Male within the 40+ age group was Michael Koontz with 25:03 and female winner was Patty Pirtle with a time of 34:40.

Annual Drinking Water Quality Report

Town of New Market

INTRODUCTION

This Annual Drinking Water Quality Report for calendar year 2015 is designed to provide you with valuable information about your drinking water quality. We are committed to providing you with a safe and dependable supply of drinking water, and we want you to understand the efforts we make to protect your water supply. The quality of your drinking water meets all state and federal requirements administered by the Virginia Department of Health (VDH). If you have questions about this report, want additional information about any aspect of your drinking water, or want to know how to participate in decisions that may affect the quality of your drinking water, please contact:

GENERAL INFORMATION

As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity. Substances (referred to as contaminants) in source water may come from septic systems, discharges from domestic or industrial wastewater treatment facilities, agricultural and farming activities, urban storm water runoff, residential uses, and many other types of activities. Water from surface sources is treated to make it drinkable while groundwater may or may not have any treatment.

All drinking water, including bottled drinking water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information can be obtained by calling the Environmental Protection Agency's Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immune-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. EPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by *Cryptosporidium* and other microbiological contaminants are available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

SOURCES AND TREATMENT OF YOUR DRINKING WATER

For calendar year 2015 your drinking water came from groundwater and groundwater under the influence of surface water obtained from six drilled wells. Water is distributed throughout Town by a booster pump station, one storage tank and variously sized distribution piping.

Treatment of Wells 1 and 6 consists of chlorination. As water is pumped from the wells, a chlorine solution is injected into a combined well discharge line to disinfect the water prior to distribution.

Treatment of Wells 2, 4, 8, and the Shenandoah Valley Academy (SVA) Well consist of membrane filtration and chlorination. Water pumped from the wells passes through a basket strainer to pretreat the water prior to membrane filtration and chlorination. The membrane filtration eliminates turbidity and bacteria from the water while chlorination is used to disinfect the water prior to distribution.

SOURCE WATER ASSESSMENTS

A source water assessment for the Town of New Market was completed by the ENSAT Corporation in cooperation with the County of Shenandoah and Shenandoah County Water Resources Advisory Committee. This assessment determined that the Town's water sources may be susceptible to contamination because they are groundwater or surface influenced groundwater exposed to a wide array of contaminants at varying concentrations. Changing hydrologic, hydraulic, and atmospheric conditions promote migration of contaminants from land use activities of concern within the assessment area. More specific information may be obtained by contacting the water system representative referenced within this report.

QUALITY OF OUR DRINKING WATER

Your drinking water is routinely monitored according to Federal and State Regulations for a variety of contaminants. The table on the next page shows the results of our monitoring for the period of January 1st to December 31st, 2015.

Most of the results in the table are from testing done in 2015. However, the state allows us to monitor for some contaminants less than once per year because the concentrations of these contaminants do not change frequently. Some of our data, though accurate, is more than one year old.

DEFINITIONS

In the table and elsewhere in this report you will find many terms and abbreviations you might not be familiar with. The following definitions are provided to help you better understand these terms:

Non-detects (ND) - lab analysis indicates that the contaminant is not present

Parts per million (ppm) or Milligrams per liter (mg/l) - one part per million corresponds to one minute in two years or a single penny in \$10,000.

Parts per billion (ppb) or Micrograms per liter - one part per billion corresponds to one minute in 2,000 years, or a single penny in \$10,000,000.

Picocuries per liter (pCi/L) - picocuries per liter is a measure of the radioactivity in water.

Nephelometric Turbidity Unit (NTU) - nephelometric turbidity unit is a measure of the clarity of water.

Turbidity in excess of 5 NTU is just noticeable to the average person.

Action Level - the concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements which a water system must follow.

Treatment Technique (TT) - a required process intended to reduce the level of a contaminant in drinking water.

Maximum Contaminant Level, or MCL - the highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

Maximum Contaminant Level Goal, or MCLG - the level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.

Variances and exemptions - state or EPA permission not to meet an MCL or a treatment technique under certain conditions

Entry Point (EP) - place where water from the source or sources after the application of any treatment is delivered to the distribution system

WATER QUALITY RESULTS

We constantly monitor for various contaminants in the water supply to meet all regulatory requirements. The tables list only those contaminants that had some level of detection. Many other contaminants have been analyzed but were not present or were below the detection limits of the lab equipment.

Maximum Contaminant Levels (MCL's) are set at very stringent levels by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency. In developing the standards EPA assumes that the average adult drinks 2 liters of water each day throughout a 70-year life span. EPA generally sets MCL's at levels that will result in no adverse health effects for some contaminants or a one-in-ten-thousand to one-in-a-million chance of having the described health effect for other contaminants.

- (3) Infants and children who drink water containing lead in excess of the action level could experience delays in their physical or mental development. Children could show slight deficits in attention span and learning abilities. Adults who drink this water over many years could develop kidney problems or high blood pressure.


Lead Contaminants

If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. The Town of New Market is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in the plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to have your water tested. Information on the lead in drinking water, testing methods, and steps you can take to minimize exposure is available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline or at <http://www.epa.gov/safewater/lead>.

ADJUSTMENT POLICY FOR FILLING SWIMMING POOLS

Swimming pool adjustments will be limited to one (1) adjustment per calendar year per customer. To qualify for this annual adjustment, the customer must submit an Application for Swimming Pool Credit prior to the filling of a swimming pool. In addition, the meter must be read by Town staff before and after the filling of the pool. Customers that are billed for water only or have a water-only meter will not qualify for a pool credit. Splasher pools also known as "kiddie" pools, hot tubs, or spas will not qualify for a pool adjustment. NEW MARKET COMMUNITY POOL

Seasonal Hours

The pool officially opens on a limited basis (weekends only) beginning on Memorial Day weekend. It will then be open seven days a week beginning on June 20th. The hours of operation are from 11:00 am - 6:00 pm. The pool is open to all members of the public, but children under 10 years of age should be accompanied by an adult. All guests are expected to abide by the rules and regulations posted at the pool. Snacks and drinks are available for purchase at the concession stand.

Summer Passes

- Ages 12 & up - (\$60)
- Ages 11 & under - (\$50)

Daily Admission

- Ages 12 & up - (\$4)
- Ages 6-11 - (\$3)
- Free Admission for ages 5 and under when accompanied by a paying adult

NEW MARKET POLICE DEPARTMENT

During the month of April the Police Department responded to 457 calls for service. There were 3 physical arrests, 3 motor vehicle crashes, and the Police Department issued 20 summonses for various traffic violations.

Walking is an excellent form of exercise that most anyone can do. If you plan to walk in an area where there is vehicular traffic, you should be aware of safe walking practices. Here are a few safety tips to keep in mind:

- Wear light colors so motorists can see you
- Use sidewalks if available
- If walking on roads, face traffic and travel on extreme edge
- When crossing a street look left, look right and look left again
- At night reflective clothing or flashlights make you more visible to motorists
- Keep in mind dusk and dawn are the most dangerous times of the day for pedestrians

The Police Department is participating in the VA Checkpoint Strikeforce campaign throughout the remainder of the year. The Police Department will be conducting a DUI checkpoint during the month of June in an effort to apprehend impaired drivers and increase the perception of "risk of apprehension" of motorist who would operate a vehicle while impaired by alcohol or other drugs.
